Calling Wales' Creative Kids!

Back in October 2024 we asked you to write poems to show your support to Cymru as they were preparing to play the UEFA Women's EURO play-off matches.

And you delivered!

We received over 400 individual poems, which were shown to the Cymru players to inspire them before they faced Slovakia on Tuesday 29 October.

Angharad James, Cymru Captain said:

We're truly inspired by the support we're seeing from schools and children all over Wales, it means the world to us. Reading these poems filled with passion, pride, and creativity has given us an extra boost.

Sarah was so impressed with the poems you wrote to support Cymru before the play-offs - poems full of creativity, energy and inspiration - that she now has another task for you!

The Task

Cymru and Me

How do you feel when you watch Cymru? Poetry is a great way to express yourself and your perspective is unique. You could write a poem about a game you attended or you watched on TV or perhaps what the Cymru women's team mean to you.

You are all poets with a story to tell! Tip: One way to make your poems extra creative is to include all the senses. This can make your writing feel alive and jump off the page like a leaping header. See if you can include all five. What do you hear when you watch a game? What do you see? Can you feel the goosebumps? Smell the wet grass? And maybe you even have a tasty halftime snack!

Example - a poem by Sarah McCreadie:

Wales vs Slovakia, October 29th 2024

- She is blushing in red, first game
- They have ponytails too
- The glitter finish she opted for on her face paint
- lit by floodlight
- Giddy
- to see a woman wear red
- hear names like school friends
- Kayleigh, Hannah, Ffion
- sung in folklore hymn

She too sings Wales Wales Wales Joins the choir eternal Her voice floats on to the pitch down the touchline into the penalty box Gôl

For Teachers: Guide your learners to expand on the senses

- What do you see at a Cymru match? What do you see on the pitch? Perhaps you See: could write about all the colours, the crowd or what it looks like when we score a goal!
- What do you hear? What do The Red Wall sound like? What does it sound like when Hear: the ball hits the back of the net?
- Taste: This one is more of a challenge but you can do it. Maybe you have particular halftime snacks!
- Smell: Think about the smells in the air, from the wet grass to the burger vans!
- Touch: What does it feel for a player to kick a ball? Or to pull off an important save! Or perhaps even a knee-slide celebration...

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Barod? Ready? Get writing!

We would love to see your work. Why not film yourself performing it, or maybe you could take pictures, and share them on your school's social media platform*. You can write as an individual, in pairs or as a group/class.
